
Chapter 1 Introduction



This Chapter provides an overview of the TEW-435BRM's features and capabilities.

Congratulations on the purchase of your new TEW-435BRM. The TEW-435BRM is a multifunction device providing the following services:

- ADSL Modem.
- Shared Broadband Internet Access for all LAN users.
- Wireless Access Point for 802.11b and 802.11g Wireless Stations.
- 4-Port Switching Hub for 10BaseT or 100BaseT connections.



The TEW-435BRM incorporates many advanced features, carefully designed to provide sophisticated functions while being easy to use.

- **Shared Internet Access.** All users on the LAN or WLAN can access the Internet through the TEW-435BRM, using only a single external IP Address. The local (invalid) IP Addresses are hidden from external sources. This process is called NAT (Network Address Translation).
- **Built-in ADSL Modem.** The TEW-435BRM has a built-in ADSL modem, supporting all common ADSL connections.
- *IPoA, PPPoE, PPPoA, Direct Connection Support.* The TEW-435BRM supports all common connection methods.

- *Auto-detection of Internet Connection Method.* In most situations, the TEW-435BRM can test your ADSL and Internet connection to determine the connection method used by your ISP.
- *Fixed or Dynamic IP Address.* On the Internet (WAN port) connection, the TEW-435BRM supports both Dynamic IP Address (IP Address is allocated on connection) and Fixed IP Address.

- *Application Level Gateways (ALGs)*. Applications which use non-standard connections or port numbers are normally blocked by the Firewall. The ability to define and allow such applications is provided, to enable such applications to be used normally.
- *Virtual Servers.* This feature allows Internet users to access Internet servers on your LAN. The required setup is quick and easy.
- **URL Filter.** Use the URL Filter to block access to undesirable Web sites by LAN users.
- *Logs.* Define what data is recorded in the Logs, and optionally send log data to a Syslog Server. Log data can also be E-mailed to you.
- *Firewall.* As well as the built-in firewall to protect your LAN, you can define Firewall Rules to determine which incoming and outgoing traffic should be permitted.
- **Dynamic DNS Support.** DDNS, when used with the Virtual Servers feature, allows users to connect to Servers on your LAN using a Domain Name, even if you have a dynamic IP address which changes every time you connect.
- *VPN Pass through Support.* PCs with VPN (Virtual Private Networking) software using PPTP, L2TP and IPSec are transparently supported no configuration is required.

- *Standards Compliant.* The TEW-435BRM complies with the IEEE802.11g (DSSS) specifications for Wireless LANs.
- *Supports both 802.11b and 802.11g Wireless Stations.* The 802.11g standard provides for backward compatibility with the 802.11b standard, so both 802.11b and 802.11g Wireless stations can be used simultaneously.
- Speeds to 54Mbps. All speeds up to the 802.11g maximum of 54Mbps are supported.
- *WEP support.* Support for WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) is included. Key sizes of 64 Bit and 128 Bit are supported.
- *Wireless MAC Access Control.* The Wireless Access Control feature can check the MAC address (hardware address) of Wireless stations to ensure that only trusted Wireless Stations can access your LAN.
- *Simple Configuration.* If the default settings are unsuitable, they can be changed quickly and easily.

- **4-Port Switching Hub.** The TEW-435BRM incorporates a 4-port 10/100BaseT switching hub, making it easy to create or extend your LAN.
- **DHCP Server Support.** Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol provides a dynamic IP address to PCs and other devices upon request. The TEW-435BRM can act as a **DHCP Server** for devices on your local LAN and WLAN.

- *Easy Setup.* Use your WEB browser from anywhere on the LAN or WLAN for configuration.
- *Configuration File Upload/Download.* Save (download) the configuration data from the TEW-435BRM to your PC, and restore (upload) a previously-saved configuration file to the TEW-435BRM.
- **Remote Management.** The TEW-435BRM can be managed from any PC on your LAN. And, if the Internet connection exists, it can also (optionally) be configured via the Internet.
- *Network Diagnostics.* You can use the TEW-435BRM to perform a *Ping* or *DNS lookup*.

- **Password protected Configuration**. Optional password protection is provided to prevent unauthorized users from modifying the configuration data and settings.
- *Wireless LAN Security*. WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) is supported, as well as Wireless access control to prevent unknown wireless stations from accessing your LAN.
- *NAT Protection.* An intrinsic side effect of NAT (Network Address Translation) technology is that by allowing all LAN users to share a single IP address, the location and even the existence of each PC is hidden. From the external viewpoint, there is no network, only a single device the TEW-435BRM.
- *Firewall.* All incoming data packets are monitored and all incoming server requests are filtered, thus protecting your network from malicious attacks from external sources.
- **Protection against DoS attacks.** DoS (Denial of Service) attacks can flood your Internet connection with invalid packets and connection requests, using so much bandwidth and so many resources that Internet access becomes unavailable. The TEW-435BRM incorporates protection against DoS attacks.




Figure 2: Front Panel




Figure 3: Rear Panel

This Chapter covers the physical installation of the TEW-435BRM.

- Network cables. Use standard 10/100BaseT network (UTP) cables with RJ45 connectors.
- TCP/IP protocol must be installed on all PCs.
- For Internet Access, an Internet Access account with an ISP, and a DSL connection.
- To use the Wireless Access Point, all Wireless devices must be compliant with the IEEE 802.11g or IEEE 802.11b specifications.




Figure 4: Installation Diagram

Use standard LAN cables to connect PCs to the Switching Hub ports on the TEW-435BRM. Both 10BaseT and 100BaseT connections can be used simultaneously.

If required, connect any port to a normal port on another Hub, using a standard LAN cable. Any LAN port on the TEW-435BRM will automatically function as an "Uplink" port when required.

Connect the supplied ADSL cable from to the WAN port on the TEW-435BRM (the RJ11 connector) to the ADSL terminator provided by your phone company.

Connect the supplied power adapter to the TEW-435BRM and power up. Use only the power adapter provided. Using a different one may cause hardware damage

- The *Power* LED should be ON.
- The *Status* LED should flash, then turn Off. If it stays on or blinking after 60 seconds, there is a hardware error.
- For each LAN (PC) connection, one of the LAN LEDs should be ON (provided the PC is also ON.)

- The WAN LED should be ON if ADSL line is connected.

Before attempting to configure the TEW-435BRM, please ensure that:

- Your PC can establish a physical connection to the TEW-435BRM. The PC and the TEW-435BRM must be directly connected (using the Hub ports on the TEW-435BRM) or on the same LAN segment.
- The TEW-435BRM must be installed and powered ON.
- If the TEW-435BRM's default IP Address (192.168.0.1) is already used by another device, the other device must be turned OFF until the TEW-435BRM is allocated a new IP Address during configuration.

To establish a connection from your PC to the TEW-435BRM:

- 1. After installing the TEW-435BRM in your LAN, start your PC. If your PC is already running, restart it.
- 2. Start your WEB browser.
- 3. In the *Address* box, enter "HTTP://" and the IP Address of the TEW-435BRM, as in this example, which uses the TEW-435BRM's default IP Address:

HTTP://192.168.0.1

- 4. When prompted for the User name and Password, enter values as follows:
 - User name admin
 - Password password

If the TEW-435BRM does not respond, check the following:
The TEW-435BRM is properly installed, LAN connection is OK, and it is powered ON. You can test the connection by using the "Ping" command:
Open the MS-DOS window or command prompt window.
Enter the command:
ping 192.168.0.1
```

If no response is received, either the connection is not working, or your PC's IP address is not compatible with the TEW-435BRM's IP Address. (See next item.)

- If your PC is using a fixed IP Address, its IP Address must be within the range 192.168.0.2 to 192.168.0.254 to be compatible with the TEW-435BRM's default IP Address of 192.168.0.1. Also, the *Network Mask* must be set to 255.255.255.0. See *Chapter 4 PC Configuration* for details on checking your PC's TCP/IP settings.
- Ensure that your PC and the TEW-435BRM are on the same network segment. (If you don't have a router, this must be the case.)
- Ensure you are using the wired LAN interface. The Wireless interface can only be used if its configuration matches your PC's wireless settings.

The first time you connect to the TEW-435BRM, the Setup Wizard will run automatically. (The Setup Wizard will also run if the TEW-435BRM's default settings are restored.)

- 1. Step through the Wizard until finished.
 - You need the data supplied by your ISP. Most connection methods require some data input.
 - The common connection types are explained in the following table.
- 2. On the final screen of the Wizard, run the test and check that an Internet connection can be established.
- 3. If the connection test fails:
 - Check all connections, and the front panel LEDs.
 - Check that you have entered all data correctly.

A DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) **Server** allocates a valid IP address to a DHCP **Client** (PC or device) upon request.

- The client request is made when the client device starts up (boots).
- The DHCP Server provides the *Gateway* and *DNS* addresses to the client, as well as allocating an IP Address.

- The TEW-435BRM can act as a **DHCP server**.
- Windows 95/98/ME and other non-Server versions of Windows will act as a DHCP client. This is the default Windows setting for the TCP/IP network protocol. However, Windows uses the term *Obtain an IP Address automatically* instead of "DHCP Client".
- You must NOT have two (2) or more DHCP Servers on the same LAN segment. (If your LAN does not have other Routers, this means there must only be one (1) DHCP Server on your LAN.)

This is the default setting. The DHCP Server settings are on the *LAN* screen. On this screen, you can:

- Enable or Disable the TEW-435BRM's DHCP Server function.
- Set the range of IP Addresses allocated to PCs by the DHCP Server function.

You can only use one (1) DHCP Server per LAN segment. If you wish to use another DHCP Server, rather than the TEW-435BRM's, the following procedure is required.

- 1. Disable the DHCP Server feature in the TEW-435BRM. This setting is on the LAN screen.
- 2. Configure the DHCP Server to provide the TEW-435BRM's IP Address as the *Default Gateway*.

Note that the TEW-435BRM will automatically accept both 802.11b and 802.11g connections, and no configuration is required for this feature.

- Block Always allow blocking all of the time, independent of the Schedule page.

- 1. You must register for the service at http://www.dyndns.org (Registration is free). Your password will be E-mailed to you.
- 2. After registration, use the "Create New Host" option (at www.dyndns.org) to request your desired Domain name.
- 3. Enter your data from www.dyndns.org in the TEW-435BRM's DDNS screen.
- 4. The TEW-435BRM will then automatically ensure that your current IP Address is recorded at http://www.dyndns.org
- 5. From the Internet, users will be able to connect to your Virtual Servers (or DMZ PC) using your Domain name, as shown on this screen.




Figure 37: Virtual Servers

Normally, it is not necessary to use these screens, or change any settings. These screens and settings are provided to deal with non-standard situations, or to provide additional options for advanced users.

The available settings and features are:

PC Database	This is the list of PCs shown when you select the "DMZ PC" or a "Vir- tual Server". This database is maintained automatically, but you can add and delete entries for PCs which use a Fixed (Static) IP Address.
Config File	Backup or restore the configuration file for the TEW-435BRM. This file contains all the configuration data.
Logs & Email	View or clear all logs, set E-Mailing of log files and alerts.
Diagnostics	Perform a Ping or DNS Lookup.
Remote Admin	Allow settings to be changed from the Internet
Routing	Only required if your LAN has other Routers or Gateways.
Upgrade Firmware	Upgrade the Firmware (software) installed in your TEW-435BRM.

The PC Database is used whenever you need to select a PC (e.g. for the "DMZ" PC).




Figure 47: Routing Example

Appendix A Troubleshooting



This Appendix covers the most likely problems and their solutions.

Nudquhdv

This chapter covers some common problems that may be encountered while using the TEW-435BRM and some possible solutions to them. If you follow the suggested steps and the TEW-435BRM still does not function properly, contact your dealer for further advice.

Fdmdq.k Oqnakd Ir

Problem 1: Can't connect to the TEW-435BRM to configure it.

Solution 1: Check the following:

- The TEW-435BRM is properly installed, LAN connections are OK, and it is powered ON.
- Ensure that your PC and the TEW-435BRM are on the same network segment. (If you don't have a router, this must be the case.)
- If your PC is set to "Obtain an IP Address automatically" (DHCP client), restart it.
- If your PC uses a Fixed (Static) IP address, ensure that it is using an IP Address within the range 192.168.0.2 to 192.168.0.254 and thus compatible with the TEW-435BRM's default IP Address of 192.168.0.1. Also, the Network Mask should be set to 255.255.255.0 to match the TEW-435BRM.

In Windows, you can check these settings by using *Control Panel*-*Network* to check the *Properties* for the TCP/IP protocol.

Hmsdqmds.bbdrr

Problem 1: When I enter a URL or IP address I get a time out error.

- **Solution 1:** A number of things could be causing this. Try the following troubleshooting steps.
 - Check if other PCs work. If they do, ensure that your PCs IP settings are correct. If using a Fixed (Static) IP Address, check the Network Mask, Default gateway and DNS as well as the IP Address.
 - If the PCs are configured correctly, but still not working, check the TEW-435BRM. Ensure that it is connected and ON. Connect to it and check its settings. (If you can't connect to it, check the LAN and power connections.)
 - Check the TEW-435BRM's status screen to see if it is working correctly.

Problem 2: Some applications do not run properly when using the TEW-435BRM.

Solution 2: The TEW-435BRM processes the data passing through it, so it is not transparent.

For incoming connections, you must use the Virtual Server or Firewall Rules to specify the PC which will receive the incoming traffic.

You can also use the *DMZ* function. This should work with almost every application, but:

- It is a security risk, since the firewall is disabled.
- Only one (1) PC can use this feature.

hqdkdrr.bbdrr

Problem 1: My PC can't locate the Wireless Access Point.

- **Solution 1:** Check the following.
 - Your PC is set to *Infrastructure Mode*. (Access Points are always in *Infrastructure Mode*)
 - The SSID on your PC and the Wireless Access Point are the same. Remember that the SSID is case-sensitive. So, for example "Workgroup" does NOT match "workgroup".
 - Both your PC and the TEW-435BRM must have the same setting for WEP. The default setting for the TEW-435BRM is disabled, so your wireless station should also have WEP disabled.
 - If WEP is enabled on the TEW-435BRM, your PC must have WEP enabled, and the key must match.
 - If the TEW-435BRM's *Wireless* screen is set to *Allow Trusted PCs only*, then each of your Wireless stations must have been designated as "Trusted", or the Wireless station will be blocked.
 - To see if radio interference is causing a problem, see if connection is possible when close to the TEW-435BRM. Remember that the connection range can be as little as 100 feet in poor environments.

Problem 2: Wireless connection speed is very slow.

- **Solution 2:** The wireless system will connect at the highest possible speed, depending on the distance and the environment. To obtain the highest possible connection speed, you can experiment with the following:
 - TEW-435BRM location. Try adjusting the location and orientation of the TEW-435BRM.
 - Wireless Channel If interference is the problem, changing to another channel may show a marked improvement.
 - Radio Interference Other devices may be causing interference. You can experiment by switching other devices Off, and see if this helps. Any "noisy" devices should be shielded or relocated.
 - RF Shielding

Your environment may tend to block transmission between the wireless stations. This will mean high access speed is only possible when close to the TEW-435BRM.

Appendix B About Wireless LANs



This Appendix provides some background information about using Wireless LANs (WLANs).

Lncdr

Wireless LANs can work in either of two (2) modes:

- Ad-hoc
- Infrastructure
- . c-gnb Lncd

Ad-hoc mode does not require an Access Point or a wired (Ethernet) LAN. Wireless Stations (e.g. notebook PCs with wireless cards) communicate directly with each other.

Hmeq.rsqtbstqdLncd

In Infrastructure Mode, one or more Access Points are used to connect Wireless Stations (e.g. Notebook PCs with wireless cards) to a wired (Ethernet) LAN. The Wireless Stations can then access all LAN resources.

A group of Wireless Stations and a single Access Point, all using the same ID (SSID), form a Basic Service Set (BSS).

Using the same SSID is essential. Devices with different SSIDs are unable to communicate with each other.

DRR

A group of Wireless Stations, and multiple Access Points, all using the same ID (ESSID), form an Extended Service Set (ESS).

Different Access Points within an ESS can use different Channels. In fact, to reduce interference, it is recommended that adjacent Access Points SHOULD use different channels.

As Wireless Stations are physically moved through the area covered by an ESS, they will automatically change to the Access Point which has the least interference or best performance. This capability is called **Roaming**. (Access Points do not have or require Roaming capabilities.)

0g.mmdkr

The Wireless Channel sets the radio frequency used for communication.

- Access Points use a fixed Channel. You can select the Channel used. This allows you to choose a Channel which provides the least interference and best performance. In the USA and Canada, 11 channel are available. If using multiple Access Points, it is better if adjacent Access Points use different Channels to reduce interference.
- In "Infrastructure" mode, Wireless Stations normally scan all Channels, looking for an Access Point. If more than one Access Point can be used, the one with the strongest signal is used. (This can only happen within an ESS.)
- If using "Ad-hoc" mode (no Access Point), all Wireless stations should be set to use the same Channel. However, most Wireless stations will still scan all Channels to see if there is an existing "Ad-hoc" group they can join.

v d o

WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) is a standard for encrypting data before it is transmitted.

This is desirable because it is impossible to prevent snoopers from receiving any data which is transmitted by your Wireless Stations. But if the data is encrypted, then it is meaningless unless the receiver can decrypt it.

If WEP is used, the Wireless Stations and the Access Point must have the same settings for each of the following:

WEP	Off, 64 Bit, 128 Bit
Key	For 64 Bit encryption, the Key value must match. For 128 Bit encryption, the Key value must match
WEP Authentication	Open System or Shared Key.

To allow Wireless Stations to use the Access Point, the Wireless Stations and the Access Point must use the same settings, as follows:

	WEP Key: If WEP is enabled, the Key must be the same on the Wireless Stations and the Access Point.
